*The papers compiled in the present volume aim at investigating the many fruitful manners in which cognitive linguistics can expand further on cognitive translation studies. Some papers (e.g. Halverson, Muñoz-Martín, Martín de León) take a theoretical stand, since the epistemological and ontological bases of both areas (cognitive linguistics and translation studies) should be known before specific contributions of cognitive linguistic to translation are tackled. Several works in the volume attempt to illustrate how some of the notions imported from cognitive linguistics may contribute to enrich our understanding of the translation process in a general translation problem such as metaphor (e.g. Samaniego), the relationship between form and meaning (e.g. Tabakowska, Rojo and Valenzuela) or cultural aspects (e.g. Bernárdez, Sharifian/Jamarani). Others use translation as an empirical field to test some of the basic assumptions of cognitive linguistics such as frames (e.g. Boas), metonymy (e.g. Brdar/Brdar-Szabó), and lexicalisation patterns (e.g. Ibarretxe-Antuñano/Filipovi?). Finally, another set of papers (e.g. Feist, Hatzidaki) opens up new lines of investigation for experimental research, a very promising area still underdeveloped. Volume III examines in clear and elegant prose the roles of knowledge and information in economics. Part One analyzes the effects of new or uncertain information on market performance; examines the formation and revision of expectations; and provides a classification of literature and an extensive bibliography. Part Two discusses private and social valuations of education and training, the controversy over nature vs. nurture," the issue of "credentialism," and the depreciation of human capital. Für die historische Entwicklung der Psychiatrie stellt das 19. Jahrhundert eine entscheidende Epoche dar. In dieses Jahrhundert fallen Prozesse und Ereignisse, die bis heute die Struktur und Ausrichtung des Faches massgeblich pragen: So ist die Entstehung der Psychiatrie als wissenschaftliche Disziplin und therapeutische Praxis mit der Tätigkeit von namhaften Psychiatern dieses Jahrhunderts, wie Reil, Heinroth, Jacobi, Griesinger oder Kraepelin, verbunden. Ebenso ist die feste Institutionalisierung des Fachs in staatlichen und privaten Versorgungseinrichtungen durch konkrete soziale, wirtschaftliche und politische Ereignisse des 19. Jahrhunderts massgeblich geprägt. Weiter steht das 19. Jahrhundert für die 'Medikalisierung' des Faches und für seine Abgrenzung sowohl gegenüber anderen medizinischen Fachrichtungen als auch gegenüber der Theologie und der Jurisprudenz. Schliesslich ist die Etablierung der Psychiatrie als universitäres Fach – mit der Einrichtung von Universitätskliniken und ordentlichen Professuren – eine Entwicklung, die ihre Wurzeln und Bedingungsfaktoren ganz wesentlich in der zweiten Hälfte des 19. Jahrhunderts im deutschsprachigen Raum hat. Überblickt man den heutigen Stand der Psychiatrie in Deutschland, aber auch international, so wird deutlich, wie sehr das Fach von diesen historischen Vermachtnissen geprägt worden ist. Auch wenn das 20. Jahrhundert mit zum Teil fatalen und einschneidenden Ereignissen und Entwicklungen verbunden war, weisen die vorangegangenen Weichenstellungen doch auf eine überraschende Aktualität des 19. Jahrhunderts für die Psychiatrie des 21. Jahrhunderts hin.

The eighteenth century saw the first significant phase of cultural interchange between Britain and Germany. This study examines the part played in this process by women writers, who were entering the literary world in large numbers for the first time. It asks whether women - as readers, translators, and authors - were particularly receptive to the work of other women, and whether a cross-cultural female literary tradition emerged during the period. The study offers a detailed case-study of the German writer Benedikte Naubert, now known for her collection of fairy-tales but also a prolific novelist. It looks first at Naubert's engagement with English literature, that is to say at her numerous translations of English novels, and at the ways in which Anglophilia influenced the production of her own fiction. It establishes how Naubert's interest in England and English literature was related to her position as a woman writer. It then examines the reception of her novels and stories in Britain, questioning how far the response to her texts can be linked to issues of gender. Naubert's work is compared throughout to that of other women writers, and the study thus sheds new light on the extent to which cross-cultural interchange influenced the development of women's writing in both countries.
