The Douthit name is spelled many different ways. John Douthit, Sr. (1709–1784) emigrated from Ireland to southern Pennsylvania in 1724. Other Douthits, spelled various ways, had already emigrated. John Douthit, Sr. settled at Monocacy, Maryland, where he married Mary Scott in 1738. He moved to Anson County, North Carolina in 1750/1751, and later became a Moravian (members of this church settled nearby in 1753).

John Baptist Buckman (1730–1793), was born in St. Mary's Co., Maryland, the son of John Baptist Buckman and Susanne Smith. He married Ann Drinker. According to family tradition her family came to Maryland from Holland. They were parents of ten children born in St. Mary's County. All but one of the ten children migrated to Kentucky. Descendants live in Kentucky, Missouri, Illinois, Oklahoma, Texas and elsewhere.

Jacob Burki came from Rotterdam (probably originally from Switzerland) to what is now Berks County, Pennsylvania in 1733. Descendants live in many states.

The immigrant ancestor Johann Joergen Heinrich Simon Anton Toedt alias Conrad Brehe (1800-1873), was born in Holzhausen-Esterneine, Lippe-Detmold, Germany. He was the son of Johann Anton Jobst Heinrich Toedt and Wilhelmine Amalie Schmitker. In America he went by the name of Conrad Brehe. He married a widow, Anna Sophia Wilhelmine Fredericke Schaefer (1803-1863) in 1829 in Horn, Lippe- Detmold, Germany. She was the widow of Johann Christoph Brehe (ca. 1800-1829) with no children. She was the daughter of Anton Ludolph Schaefer and Anna Maria Elisabeth Gerken. Johan and Anna had six children. Family came to Missouri in 1847. Descendants live in Missouri, Iowa, Illinois, South Dakota, California and elsewhere. Some ancestors have been traced to the early 1700s in Germany.

Jacob Lawrence was one of the best-known African American artists of the twentieth century. In *Painting Harlem Modern*, Patricia Hills renders a vivid assessment of Lawrence's long and productive career. She argues that his complex, cubist-based paintings developed out of a vital connection with a modern Harlem that was filled with artists, writers, musicians, and social activists. She also uniquely positions Lawrence alongside such important African American writers as Langston Hughes, Richard Wright, and Ralph Ellison. Drawing from a wide range of archival materials and interviews with artists, Hills interprets Lawrence's art as distilled from a life of struggle and perseverance. The Foster and associated families are said to descend from Anacher who was the founder of the Flemish dynasty of Baldwin, Counts of Flanders. Richard of Flanders, brother-in-law of William the Conquerer, accompanied the Normans to England in 1066. Richard was surnamed Forrester after the conquest and is considered to be the common ancestor of the Forsters and Fosters. In the early 1600s, Richard Foster (1619-1681) immigrated to Virginia. He was the father of at least three children. Descendants live in Virginia, Missouri, Texas and other parts of the United States.

This is a definitive bibliography of over 600 years of the Arthurian tradition in English. It is a chronological and descriptive listing of Arthurian literature and related material from the beginning of the English language to 2000.

Looking back at her lengthy career just four years before her death, modernist painter Nell Blaine said, "Art is central to my life. Not being able to make or see art would be a major deprivation." The Virginia native's creative path began early, and, during the course of her life, she overcame significant barriers in her quest to make and even see art, including serious vision problems, polio, and paralysis. And then there was her gender. In 1957 Blaine was hailed by Life magazine as someone to watch, profiled alongside four other emerging painters whom the journalist praised "not as notable women artists but as notable artists who happen to be women." In *Central to Their Lives*, twenty-six noted art historians offer scholarly insight into the achievements of female artists working in and inspired by the American South. Spanning the decades between the late 1890s and early 1960s, this volume examines the complex challenges these artists faced in a traditionally conservative region during a period in which women's social, cultural, and political roles were being redefined and reinterpreted. The presentation—and its companion exhibition—features artists from all of the Southern states, including Dusti Bongé, Anne Goldtwiate, Anna Hyatt Huntington, Ida Kohlmeyer, Lois Mailou Jones, Alma Thomas, and Helen Turner. These essays examine

how the variables of historical gender norms, educational barriers, race, regionalism, sisterhood, suffrage, and modernism mitigated and motivated these women who were seeking expression on canvas or in clay. Whether working from studio space, in spare rooms at home, or on the world stage, these artists made remarkable contributions to the art world while fostering future generations of artists through instruction, incorporating new aesthetics into the fine arts, and challenging the status quo. Sylvia Youn, the Lawrence A. Fleischman Curator in Charge of the American Wing at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, provides a foreword to the volume. Contributors:Sara C.
